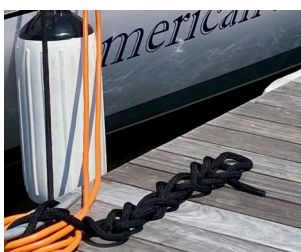

## **Weather Course**

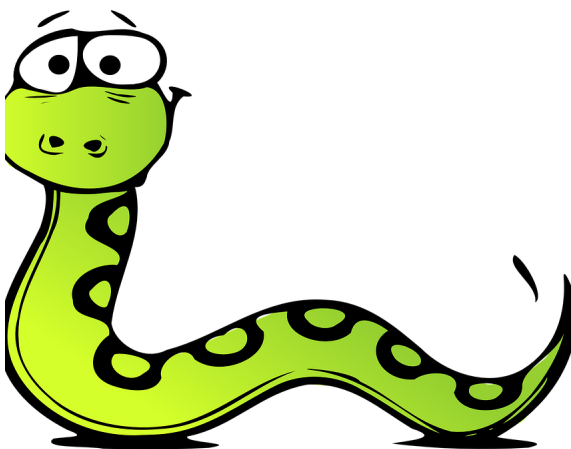
## Snakes on a boat

Apparently this can be a real issue if you google it. I only want to reference a report from 2018 about a rattlesnake falling from a tree onto a kayaker in South Carolina and biting that paddler.

What would cause a snake to bite you while on a boat? Mainly disturbing it. If you see a snake your best bet is to leave it alone. My sister suggested moving it with a paddle or stick but unless in immediate harm, let it be.

Harmon Everett of the Houston Canoe Club wrote an article about the subject. "If you can, make a hidey hole for the snake to crawl into, and it probably will go in, in order to hide and feel safe. If it gets in your boat and crawls into a hidey hole, leave it alone," Everett recommends. "It will probably stay there. If it feels safe and is not hungry, you and snakes can coexist and maybe even become contented acquaintances. I don't think 'friends' is one of their emotions.



When you get to land, you can empty out your boat and safely escort the snake to go away."

A later report had the cousin defend the snake. The paddler who was bitten at first thought he paddled over an alligator. He went to pick it up, he learned it was a baby rattlesnake that bit him twice. He kept the snake to show the hospital what bit him so he could get the correct anti-venom.

## Fleet Captain's Report

The U.S. Army Aberdeen Test Center (ATC) will be conducting live fire exercises and operational testing of various watercraft, scheduled to begin on or about July 12, 2021 through August 22, 2021. The area of operations includes: entering the water at Black Point, proceeding towards and operating in the Stoney Point area, then returning to the Black Point area.

The watercraft will be accompanied by ATC Patrol boats to provide escort and ensure that the area is clear of public boats. The area designated above will be CLOSED to commercial and recreational fishing and crabbing.

Kent Island Narrows North Approach continues to be shoaled to a depth of four feet in the Kent Island Narrows North Approach within the channel boundaries between Kent Island Narrows North Approach Light 2KN and Kent Island Narrows North Approach Light 8.

There has been a report of shoaling in the Northeast River within the channel between Northeast Lighted Buoy 7 and Northeast Lighted Buoy 8. Depths as low as 4.2 feet were observed.

Shoaling in the western portion of Slaughter Creek IVO of Holland Point has encroached easterly in most of the channel. The shoal adjacent to Slaughter Creek Light 2SC has encroached 50 to 100 yards easterly with observed depths of 3 to 4 feet. Shoaling to 5 feet has been observed to 5 feet on the red side of the channel between Buoy 6 and Buoy 8.

Specific new problems with buoyage in the Northern bay are shown below:

only our public boating courses but the other courses and seminars, and is a tangible way to contribute to the health of the organization to which we are so devoted.

If you are not certified, we encourage you to take the course. I, Jim Heckman, found the course extremely helpful even though I had been teaching medical students for more than 20 years. It gave me extremely useful techniques to prepare presentations, it updated me on the use of modern educational technology and gave me a chance to receive very helpful critique of short (5, 10, and 15 minute) lectures from my peers. The critiques are done by the instructors and your fellow students in a friendly, respectful manner to help you improve your presentations. It is almost impossible to improve in teaching and giving presentations without help from others.

As described below, D5 will offer this course beginning with a series of online lectures on October 14, 2021. In addition to attending the lectures, to become certified, students must present 3 presentations to a live audience and then prepare a 1-hour lesson plan. You have two choices for giving the live presentations. First, you could give them in Lancaster, PA during the District 5 Fall Conference beginning on November 11, 2021. Second, we, ABC VF, will offer students the opportunity to present the live sessions locally, most likely at the Paoli Presbyterian Church. ## The Forward Throttle Award 2021

The tradition of the Forward Throttle Award continued in 2021 after a one-year hiatus due to COVID-19 and the cancellation of the 2020 Cruise. This year's winner was an upset, but I am getting ahead of myself.

Ten boats joined all or part of the Cruise and only one remained standing at the end. Seventh Sojourn earned the anti-social award for skipping Haven Harbour and even switched marinas in St Michaels to be "closer to Foxy's". Blue Rhapsody was booted for not sharing their precious vermouth, as promised, and Ces't Si Bon was also knocked out of the running for revealing that Blue Rhapsody never planned on sharing in the first place!

Whimsey's crew made a few appearances at some events on the cruise, as did the crew of Bay Spirit, however, nobody ever saw any of these boats so they were kicked to the curb for that reason.

Sway didn't make the cut for a couple



of reasons: They almost sunk the boat due to excessive showering while the shower sump was broken, but mainly for arriving in Annapolis two days early to watch the sailboat races which, as it turned out, were cancelled.

Mile Hi Latitude was looking good to win all the marbles, that is until on the very first day they heaved a boat hook into the Annapolis mooring field. Apparently this crew does this all the time as they also heaved a fender overboard later in the week.

Meriway lost all hope of winning when they took 8 hours to travel 20 miles, all the while performing a back and forth water dance with a wayward waterman.
