What is a merit mark? A merit mark is awarded by the chief commander to a member for substantial personal effort in furthering the interest, programs and objectives of USPS, its districts and squadrons. It is a coveted award; it is by and large the only official recognition members receive for their efforts.

Only one merit mark may be awarded in a year to a member, no matter how extensive the contribution. This past year has been a very difficult year for members to contribute but it was not impossible.

Members having received five merit marks are awarded the status of "Senior Members". Members who are awarded 25 merit marks become "life members" and are exempt from paying national dues.

Members awarded 50 merit marks become a Governing Board emeritus member.

I want to thank Bill McManimen for working with me to submit these merit mark and thank all members who received merit marks for their continued contribution to ABC- VF.

Executive Officer

Thanksgiving's just past, but here are two of the things I continue to be thankful for:

That mild fall weather that gave us a long-lasting dazzle of leaves swirling, skittering, spiraling to the ground (and gutters). Before the raking and the mulching came that airborne kaleidoscope of radiant yellows, oranges and reds; it was magical.

Our Valley Forge squadron (shall we call ourselves a club?) members, who step up to solve problems, teach classes, attend meetings, and Do Things That Need to Be Done. Members are working hard to give boaters the training to be safe on the water, and the opportunities to become friends on land.

When I attended the District 5 Fall Educational Conference several weeks ago, I came away with a greater understanding of the challenges we face as a club, a district and as a national organization. You know the list, which many organizations and non-profits face, which includes:

Membership overall is declining, shrinking clubs, and leaving some with fewer than 25 members. It's hard to persuade members to become officers or even attend meetings. Covid-19 restrictions have accelerated the decline in in-person attendance at events, possibly permanently.

However, our Valley Forge club, while facing all these challenges, continues to offer courses, plan inperson activities (including the Holiday Party!) and support civic projects.

This is not magic. It's plain hard work buoyed by the belief in the importance of what we do, and perhaps a sense of loyalty to each other in our endeavors. But it's not guaranteed. To continue working, we need more hands on deck – your hands on deck.

What interest or talent do you have that you'd lend for an hour or a few hours? If you haven't already done so, fill out the Nominating Committee's survey that was emailed on Nov. 4, and return it to Lisa Fegan.

Here are some other notes from the District 5 Conference:

-Nationally, non-renewals of membership have declined from last year (meaning more members are renewing their memberships) and we are being asked to ask folks why they are not renewing. But total membership is still shrinking.

-Most members join because of educational programs, but 58% leave after two years.

-The National organization has trimmed parts of its budget, reduced staff, and cut expenses for conferences.

-One member asked that the organization institute a "transparent, comprehensive, long-range financial plan" covering 3-5 years as a way to improve planning. Ralph Bernard, National Administrative Officer, said he would pass on the recommendation.

-Another member said he has an associate membership in

two nearby clubs as a way of sharing information about boating events with his club, which has just 12 members, making it hard to staff the bridge or tackle any issues.

-National is discussing - and seeking member input on regionalizing the districts. Currently there are 332 clubs in 31 districts in America's Boating Club, but some entire districts have fewer than 200 members, and 88 clubs have fewer than 25. By contrast, our District 5 has more than 1,000 members in its 28 clubs. One proposal is to combine the districts into six regions, with memberships ranging from 2600 to 3900 members. Our proposed Northeast District would have 3130 members in 59 clubs. The change, if approved, would make the districts more equal

in size and reduce the number of district officers. You'll find more information on the D5 website in coming days

-Member Benefits now include UPS and more. Check the National website www.usps.org for new benefits, including a shipping discount from UPS.

Oh yes, one more thing I'm thankful for – that guilty pleasure called Below Deck, a "reality" show on Peacock featuring the crew and a series of rich, selfinvolved, entitled cruisers on a megayacht. It has absolutely no redeeming social value (and not much nautical info) but is a respite from day-to-day considerations, and a reminder of the lure of beckoning waters and the joy of boating with friends. What's your guilty pleasure?





The following three courses will be offered this spring as part of the Chester County Lifelong Learning (formerly CCNS) course offerings.

Title: America's Boating Course (ABC)

Location: B. Reed Henderson High School **Cost**: \$70 Dates: Mondays starting in early March, exact dates TBD Time: 7:30 PM Description:

The ABC boating course is designed for the operators of power, sail, paddle, personal watercraft and fishing boats. The course is approved by the National Association of State Boating Law Administrators and recognized by the United States Coast Guard. It meets Pennsylvania's requirements to obtain a Pennsylvania Boating Safety Education Certificate which is honored by most nearby states. The course includes topics such as: on the water safety guidelines, required safety equipment, navigation rules and aids, regulations, on the water navigation, communications, navigation tools, GPS, adverse conditions and emergencies. The course includes the ABC student course guide with detailed explanations and diagrams of the various boating topics.

Longitude by Dava Sobel.

If you ever wondered how early navigators found their way across the oceans, out of sight of land, this book will fascinate you. It details the history of navigational techniques, including the difficult problem of determining longitude on a boat at sea.

The Prize Game by Donald A. Petrie

A story about lawful looting on the high seas in the days of fighting sail. This non-fiction book delves into

the historical evolution and the development of maritime laws involving capture of sea-going vessels by pirates and privateers.

In the Heart of the Sea by Nathaniel Philbrick

This is the incredible true story of the whale ship Essex, which left Nantucket for the Pacific Ocean on a whaling expedition. An angry sperm whale sunk the ship and the 30 crew members set out in rowboats for South America, 3000 miles away. Only two of the crew survived in the end.

The Hungry Ocean by Linda Greenlaw

This is another true story written by a sword-fishing captain out of Gloucester, Massachusetts. Linda Greenlaw was the captain of one of the vessels caught in the "Perfect Storm", the storm described in the bestseller written by Sebastian Unger, which was later made into a movie. An interesting read about the life aboard a sword fishing boat.

Fleet Captain's Report

Use caution on the Patapsco River

The work on the high voltage line that crosses the Patapsco River at the Francis Scott Key Bridge that requires periodic stoppage of traffic on the river is scheduled to be completed by November 17, 2021. Auxiliary work not requiring river traffic stoppage is scheduled to continue until October 7, 2022.

Work is scheduled to be conducted 24 hours a day 7 days a week. Five barges are scheduled to work the site. The largest is 120 feet long and 120 feet wide. It will carry a 200 ton crane for pile driving. Use caution when transiting the area. The work boats will monitor VHF-FM Channels 12 and 16. BG&E will provide up dates on its web site.

Shoaling has been reported in the below locations.

-Chester River Queenstown Creek between Buoys 3 and 5. Depths of 3 and 4 feet have been reported.

-Chester River Harts Island Channel Daybeacon 3. Channel depths of 2 to 4 feet.

-Chester River Kent Island Narrows North Approach. Shoaling to a depth of 4 feet at Light 2 KN to. Approach Light 8.


-Sassafras River Daybeacon 8 to Light 10. Shoaling to 7 feet reported.

-Northeast River between Lighted Buoys 7 and 8.

<u>Seasonal Buoy Changes to Unlighted Ice Buoys</u> Chester River Lighted Buoys 6, 9 and 12. Pooles Island Flats Channel Lighted Buoy 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9.

OpenCPN, free software that runs on Windows, MAC and other systems, will be taught in the class to demonstrate to students how to use electronic charting software. Students will be required to pay a materials fee of \$95 to the instructor at the first class.



<u>May</u>



This is the tale of a sailboat adventurer who circumnavigated the Delmarva Peninsula, while exploring all the nooks and crannies the bays and tributaries had to offer. Even if you are a power boater, you will find this book an interesting read.

One Day Celestial Navigation by Otis S. Brown

Are you intimidated by the USPS Navigation courses? Don't want to spend several months learning about celestial navigation? Try this book. In the space of a day you will be able to determine your latitude by using the sun and a sextant.

Fatal Storm by Rob Mundle

The riveting story of the famous Sydney to Hobart sailboat race of 1998. When all was said and done, seven boats were abandoned at sea and five sank. Fifty-seven sailors had to be rescued and 6 died. An absolute must read for anyone who likes an exciting story about boating.

Ship of Gold in the Deep Blue Sea by Gary Kinder

in 4000 feet of water over 200 miles off the Carolina coast. When the ship sank in 1857, it went down with over 21 tons of gold from the California Gold Rush. *Life* magazine called it "the greatest treasure ever found."

The Sea Hunters II by Clive Cussler

Novelist Cussler uses the royalties from his novels on a real-life search for lost ships and wrecks. Unlike Thompson, he does this for historical purposes and for the personal fulfillment of finding a lost ship that no one else had been able to find. Cussler makes each story lively and interesting.

Inland Passage by David W. Shaw

More true stories of a sailor who plied the lakes, rivers and bays of the northeast United States. The author reveals the natural history of the waterways from Cape May to Lake Ontario and many places in between. Interesting stories about some of the areas we live and boat in.

Power Cruising by Claiborne S. Young

This is a factual, how-to book geared for the novice boater. It covers a lot of what you need to know to select, outfit and maintain your powerboat. It's an excellent companion to the Power Squadron public boating classes.
