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Fire Extinguisher Updates Megan Weber—Safety Officer New federal regulations concerning fire extinguishers on board recreational boats will take effect April 20 2022. Some of the new rules include: -If you own a boat that is model year 2018 or newer, you may need to replace your fire extinguishers. -The expiration date of a fire extinguisher cylinder must not to be more than 12 years old.

Numbers will replace Roman numerals that give greater detail of the content of the extinguishers. Find information on the new requirements <u>Here</u>: Also , America's Boating Channel has a video on YouTube under *"Fire Extinguisher Standards"* Still not 100% sure where your vessel stands on the new requirements? Ask a Vessel Safety Examiner when you get a VSC safety examination.

I ultimately guided the boat onto the trailer, connected it to the winch, and we got it Commander Ginny Parry, S secured. Then, dripping wet, I climbed

into the car, AND LANCE DIDN'T SAY A WORD! No questions, no comments. We pulled the boat out of the water, drove away and then we laughed a lot. He said later it reminded him of a Bugs Bunny movie, down to the nearby boater looking down at me and imagining him asking, "Eh, what's up, doc?" 

Fleet Captain's Report

Dredging the approaches to and within Baltimore Harbor will continue until July 20, 2022. Specifically the areas are:

-Baltimore Harbor Channels

-Craighill Enterance Channel Cutoff Angle

-Fort McHenery Channel

-Northwest Harbor East Channel

Loaded scows will be transporting to Cox Creek Dredged Material Containment Facility in Baltimore Harbor and the Northern Access Channel

turning basin at Poplar Island. Operations are underway 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. While work on the main waterways described above continues other non-commercial places of shoaling are in need of dredging and should be noted by us pleasure boaters. Those areas that have been reported are listed below.

-Chester River Kent Island Narrows North Approach between Light 2KN and Light 8. Four feet depth.

-Chester River Queenstown Creek Buoy 3 to Buoy 5. Three to four feet depth.

-Harts Island Channel Day Beacon 3 depths of 2 to 4 feet.

-Sassafras River Daybeacon 8 to Light 10 depths of seven feet.

-Northeast River Lighted Buoy 7 and 8 depths to 4.2 feet.

-Flag Harbor Light 1 and 2 depths less than5 feet.

-St. Jerome Creek depths to 3 feet between DBN 3 to Buoy 6.

-Chesapeake Beach Light 2 to Light 3 feet at MLW.

-Slaughter Creek Light 2SC Shoaling to 3 feet and shoaling to 5 feet between Buoy 6 and 8.

-Farm Creek shoaling to 3 feet between Daybeacon 2 and 7.

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News from National – Rethinking ABC

The Board of Directors of America's Boating Club has approved in principle a reorganization plan that will make sweeping changes to its structure and operation. The goal is to stem the loss of membership and to make our organization more effective and appealing to current and potential members. The Governing Board is scheduled to vote on it in September.

You still have a chance to weigh in. ABC plans to hold three virtual Town Hall meetings this spring. The first one is 8 pm March 29. These sessions would be your opportunity to voice your questions and concerns. Use the link above to find out more.

The 18-page plan details the decline in membership and revenue along with the dwindling and dissolution of some clubs. It describes some of the dissatisfactions of new members and those who have left ABC. Among their issues are the lack of boating opportunities. Among the challenges at all levels is finding enough volunteers to fill critical roles.

The plan considered four options for organizing ABC, and recommended establishing a National level of services that would provide coordinated, centralized support directly to Clubs and members. This would replace the current collection of districts that each serve local clubs.

More news from National – a report by the Finance Committee If you have not read the Finance Committee's report at the annual meeting, you should. This report examines 14 areas, and provides conclusions for each one; many are highly critical.

You can read this in a pdf on our website, at <u>ABCValleyForge.org</u>.

Many of the issues echo the concerns of the National report on reorganization, citing declining membership and revenues, with forecasts of those issues continuing without major changes. Among its conclusions:

- No organizational strategic plan is being prepared or implemented.

- No financial and organization planning collaboration is taking place, and leadership will not discuss financial issues with the Committee.

-The overall financial condition of USPS is threatened and getting worse, but there is an opportunity to right the ship.

-We need a collaborative action plan to save our organization.

Both reports give us the opportunity – the strong nudge – to determine what kind of club we want to be, and to plan for our future. Please read them.




